

RESTORATION OF CIVIL RIGHTS

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, GREETINGS:

WHEREAS, it is represented to me as Governor of Kentucky that Lyndon McWhorter DOB:3-26-1959, was tried and convicted of the charge (s) of Possession of a Controlled Substance 1<sup>st</sup> degree, 1<sup>st</sup> offense in the Laurel Circuit Court (X) or United States District Court ( ) and was sentenced by said court to serve a term of two years, six months in the Laurel County Detention Center; and;

WHEREAS, the said Lyndon McWhorter entered said institution on January 26, 2004, and after serving the time required by law, was discharged by final discharge on April 26, 2005 and;

WHEREAS, the said Lyndon McWhorter has made application to have his/her civil rights restored;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and by virtue of the authority vested in me by Sections 145 and 150 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, I, Steven L. Beshear, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, do hereby and now restore the right to vote and hold public office denied by judgement of conviction aforesaid and any prior conviction, to the said Lyndon McWhorter and direct all officials of the Commonwealth to be governed accordingly. This order only restores the right to vote and hold public office and does not restore any other civil right including but not limited to the right to receive, possess or transport in commerce a firearm or to serve on a jury.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have caused this order to be made patent, and the Seal of the Commonwealth of Kentucky to be hereto attached.
